

# Vaccine, testing, clinic time changes due to weather

Active sentinel testing sites will be closed, and health clinic appointments prior to 1 p.m. are canceled. Spain Auditorium will open for vaccines at 10 a.m., and the Highlands site will open for COVID-19 testing at 10 a.m. and for vaccinations at 2 p.m. UAB's vaccination sites at Parker High School and the Hoover Met will be closed through Wednesday; appointments will be rescheduled for Thursday and Friday. # **On-campus events to be permitted — with stipulations**

The temporary restriction on in-person student events expired Feb. 14, and safety behavior exhibited by students, faculty and staff has enabled UAB to **maintain relatively low COVID transmission**. As a result, UAB leadership is working to reduce some restrictions that will enable students to enjoy certain programming within strict, established guidelines.

during an online workshop 9 a.m. Feb. 24.


#### **Explore the intersection of public health, state policy Feb. 25**
