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DEBORAH AGER is author of *Midnight Voices* (2009) and coeditor of *The Best of 32 Poems Magazine* (2012) and *The New Promised Land: An Anthology of Contemporary Jewish American Poetry* (2013). She founded 32 *Poems Magazine* in 2003.

DANIEL ANDERSON'S work has appeared in Poetry, The Kenyon Review, New England Review, The Yale Review, The Hudson Review, Harper's, The New Republic, The Southern Review, The Sewanee Review, The Best American Poetry, and Southwest Review among other places. He has published two books of poetry, Drunk in Sunlight (Johns Hopkins University Press) and January Rain (Story Line Press), and edited The Selected Poems of Howard Nemerov (Swallow Press/Ohio University Press). His honors include a Pushcart Prize as well as fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Bogliasco Foundation. He teaches in the Creative Writing Program at the University of Oregon.

L. S. ASEKOFF has published four books of poetry: *Dreams of a Work* (1994) and *North Star* (1997) with Orchises Press, and *The Gate of Horn* (2010) and *Freedom Hill* (2011) with TriQuarterly Books/Northwestern University Press. He was recently chosen for a Witter Bynner Fellowship of the Library of Congress by poet laureate Philip Levine.

NED BALBO'S third book, The Trials of Edgar Poe and Other Poems (Story Line Press/WCU Poetry Center), was awarded the 2012 Poets' Prize and the 2010 Donald Justice Prize. His two previous books are Lives of the Sleepers (Ernest Sandeen Poetry Prize and ForeWord Book of the Year Prize) and Galileo's Banquet (Towson University Prize). His chapbook is Something Must Happen. He has received the Robert Frost Foundation Poetry Award and the John Guyon Literary Nonfiction Prize, and he was featured poet in the Fall/Winter 2011-2012 Valparaiso Poetry Review.

JO BRACHMAN, a graduate student in poetry writing at the University of West Georgia, lives outside of Atlanta.

GAYLORD BREWER is a professor at Middle Tennessee State University, where he founded and edits *Poems & Plays*. His most recent publications are an eighth book of poetry, *Give Over, Graymalkin* (Red Hen Press) and the chapbook *Ghost* (Anabiosis Press), both released in 2011. In June of 2011, he was artist in residence at the Arteles Creative Center in Finland.

ROBERT COLLINS' latest book is *Naming the Dead*, published by FutureCycle Press in 2012. He co-founded *BPR* and edited it for twenty years.

CHAD DAVIDSON is the author of *The Last Predicta* (2008) and *Consolation Miracle* (2003), both published by Southern Illinois University Press, as well as co-author with Gregory Fraser of *Writing Poetry: Creative and Critical Approaches*, (Palgrave Macmillan, 2009). He is an associate professor of literature and creative writing at the University of West Georgia near Atlanta.

ERICA DAWSON'S collection, Big-Eyed Afraid, won the 2006 Anthony Hecht Poetry Prize. Contemporary Poetry Review named it the Best Debut of 2007. Her poems have appeared in Harvard Review, Blackbird, Virginia Quarterly Review, Best American Poetry 2008 and 2012, the latest edition of Poetry: A Pocket Anthology, and other journals and anthologies. She is assistant professor of English and writing at The University of Tampa, where she teaches in the university's low-residency MFA program.

CAITLIN DOYLE'S poetry has appeared or is forthcoming in The Atlantic, The Threepenny Review, Boston Review, Best New Poets 2009, Black Warrior Review, Measure, and others. Caitlin has been awarded residency fellowships at the MacDowell Colony and the Ucross Foundation, and her honors include the Amy Award in Poetry through Poets & Writers magazine and was a Tennessee Williams Scholar in Poetry at the Sewanee Writers' Conference. Most recently, she has held the writer-in-residence position at St. Albans School in Washington, DC, served as the Jack Kerouac Writer-In-Residence at the Kerouac House in Orlando, Florida, and taught as a Lecturer in Creative Writing at Boston University.

JAMES DOYLE has written five books of poetry. The most recent is *Bending Under the Yellow Police Tapes* (Steel Toe Books). His poetry has appeared in many journals, has been featured on *Verse Daily, Poetry Daily, The Writer's Almanac* (Garrison Keillor), *American Life in Poetry* (Ted Kooser), and has been reprinted in many anthologies, including Prentice Hall's *Literature: An Introduction to Critical Reading*, used in universities across the country.

JEHANNE DUBROW is the author of three poetry collections, including most recently *Stateside*. In 2012, Northwestern University Press will publish her fourth book, *Red Army Red*. Her work has appeared in *The Southern Review*, *Crazyhorse*, *Prairie Schooner*, and *Ploughshares*. She is the Director of the

Rose O'Neill Literary House and an assistant professor in literature and creative writing at Washington College, on the Eastern Shore of Maryland.

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KATHY FAGAN is the author of four collections of poems, most recently *Lip* (2009). Appearing here is work from a fifth collection, *Sycamore*, currently in progress. Fagan teaches at Ohio State, where she co-edits the Ohio State University Press and *The Journal* Award Series in Poetry.

BRETT FOSTER'S first poetry book, *The Garbage Eater*, was published in 2011 by Triquarterly Books/Northwestern University Press. A second smaller collection, *Fall Run Road*, was recently awarded Finishing Line Press's 2011 chapbook prize, and is forthcoming. His poems have appeared or are forthcoming in *Atlanta Review*, *Cellpoems*, *The Common*, *Green Mountains Review*, *Hudson Review*, *IMAGE*, *Measure*, *Pleiades*, *Poetry East*, *Raritan*, *Seattle Review*, *Shenandoah*, and *Southwest Review*. He teaches Renaissance literature and creative writing at Wheaton College.

JOSHUA GOTTLIEB-MILLER is an MFA candidate in poetry at the University of Houston, where he teaches English. Recent poems have appeared in *Linebreak*, *Harpur Palate*, and *The Laurel Review*. New poems are forthcoming in *Poetry Salzburg Review* and *Yemassee*. He is a poetry editor for *Gulf Coast*.

JEFF HARDIN teaches at Columbia State Community College in Columbia, Tennessee. Recent and forthcoming poems appear in *The Hudson Review, The Southern Review,* North American Review, Gettysburg Review, Measure, Poetry Northwest, Southwest Review, Meridian, and Southern Poetry

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Review. His poems have been featured on Verse Daily, Poetry Daily, and Garrison Keillor's The Writer's Almanac. He is the author of two chapbooks, Deep in the Shallows (GreenTower Press) and The Slow Hill Out (Pudding House). His first collection, Fall Sanctuary (Story Line Press) received the 2004 Nicholas Roerich Prize.

KATIE HARTSOCK grew up around Youngstown, Ohio, and received an MFA from the University of Michigan. Her poems have appeared in Hanging Loose, Michigan Quarterly Review, Another Chicago Magazine, DIAGRAM, H_NGM_N, and elsewhere. She lives in Chicago and is a PhD candidate in the Comparative Literary Studies program at Northwestern University, where she works on ancient epic and classical receptions in contemporary poetry. The complete sequence of "Confidences" appears in her manuscript, Deliveries.

EDWARD HIRSCH has published eight collections of poetry, most recently *The Living Fire: New and Selected Poems* (Knopf, 2011). His prose works and edited volumes include *Poet's Choice, The Making of a Sonnet* (with Eavan Boland), and the national bestseller *How to Read a Poem: and Fall in Love with Poetry*. The recipient of numerous awards for his poetry, including a MacArthur Fellowship, he is president of the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation.

LESLEY JENIKE's first book of poems is *Ghost of Fashion* (CW Books, 2009). Her work has been published or is forthcoming in *Poetry, The Southern Review, The Gettysburg Review, Birmingham Poetry Review, Smartish Pace*, and *Waccamaw*. She was recently awarded an Individual Artist Excellence Award from the Ohio Arts Council. She teaches at the Columbus College of Art and Design.

CARRIE JERRELL's debut collection *After the Revival* won the 2008 Anthony Hecht Poetry Prize from Waywiser Press. She

is an assistant professor of English and the associate director of the MFA program at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky.

MELANIE JORDAN'S chapbook, Ghost Season, is available through Ropewalk Press. Her poems have appeared or are forthcoming in The Iowa Review, Hayden's Ferry Review, Cimarron Review, Third Coast, DIAGRAM, Crab Orchard Review, Poetry Southeast, and others. She teaches creative writing and literature at the University of West Georgia.

DAVID KIRBY is the author of numerous books, including The House on Boulevard St.: New and Selected Poems, a finalist for the 2007 National Book Award. His biography, Little Richard: The Birth of Rock 'n' Roll, was hailed by the Times Literary Supplement of London as a "hymn of praise to the emancipatory power of nonsense." His latest book of poetry is Talking About Movies with Jesus. He is the Robert O. Lawton Distinguished Professor of English at Florida State University.

ALEXIS LEVITIN has published translations in well over two hundred literary magazines, including The American Poetry Review, Kenyon Review, Grand Street, New England Review, Partisan Review, Prairie Schooner, and New Letters. He has published thirty-one books of translations, including Clarice Lispector's Soulstorm and Eugénio de Andrade's Forbidden Words: Selected Poems (both from New Directions). He recently co-translated Tapestry of the Sun: an Anthology of Ecuadorian Poetry (Coimbra Editions, 2009). He is a recipient of two NEA translation fellowships and two Fulbright Lectureships, as well as residencies at the Banff International Literary Translation Centre, The European Translators Collegium in Germany, and The Rockefeller Foundation Study Center at Bellagio, Italy.

WILLIAM LOGAN'S new book of poetry, *Madame X*, appeared from Penguin last fall. His edition of John

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Townsend Trowbridge's *Guy Vernon* was published by Minnesota in the spring.

JAMES MAY served as the editor-in-chief of *New South* from 2008 until 2011. His poetry has recently appeared or is forthcoming in *Five Points*, *New England Review*, *The New Republic*, and *Pleiades*. Currently the writer in residence at Agnes Scott College, he lives in Decatur, Georgia, with his wife, the poet Chelsea Rathburn.

LAURA MCCULLOUGH'S books include *Panic*, winner of a 2009 Kinereth Gensler Award (Alice James Books) and *Speech Acts* (Black Lawrence Press). Her next book, *Rigger Death & Hoist Another* is forthcoming in 2013. She has edited an anthology of essays on the poet Stephen Dunn, forthcoming from University of Syracuse Press, and is coediting an anthology of essays on poetry and race.

Poems are forthcoming in Prick of the Spindle. He was a Howard Nemerov Scholar at the 2011 Sewanee Writers' Conference. An early chapbook was published by Blue Canary Press (Milwaukee) in 1993. Salmon Poetry published his first collection, Waiting for Saint Brendan, in May 2012.

NICK MCRAE is the author of *Mountain Redemption* (Black Lawrence Press, 2013) and *Moravia* (Folded Word Press, 2013). ZACHARIAH MCVICKER graduated with a BA in English at The Ohio State University. In the summer of 2012, he participated in the Bucknell Seminar for Younger Poets. This is his first publication.

SANDRA MEEK is the author of four books of poems, Road Scatter (Persea Books, September 2012), Biogeography, winner of the Dorset Prize (Tupelo, 2008), Burn (2005), and Nomadic Foundations (2002), as well as a chapbook, The Circumference of Arrival (2001). She is also the editor of an anthology, Deep Travel: Contemporary American Poets Abroad (Ninebark, 2007), which was awarded a 2008 Independent Publisher Book Award Gold Medal. Meek served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Manyana, Botswana, 1989-1991. She is a co-founding editor of Ninebark Press, director of the Georgia Poetry Circuit, poetry editor of the Phi Kappa Phi Forum, and Dana Professor of English, Rhetoric, and Writing at Berry College in Rome, Georgia.

ERIKA MEITNER is the author, most recently, of *Makeshift Instructions for Vigilant Girls* (Anhinga Press, 2011), and *Ideal Cities* (HarperCollins, 2010), which was a 2009 National Poetry Series winner. Her poems have been published in *The New Republic, Virginia Quarterly Review, The American Poetry Review, Tin House*, and elsewhere. She is currently an associate professor of English at Virginia Tech, where she teaches in the MFA program.

SUSANNAH B. MINTZ, associate professor of English at Skidmore College, is the author of *Threshold Poetics: Milton and Intersubjectivity* (Delaware, 2003) and *Unruly Bodies: Life Writing by Women with Disabilities* (North Carolina, 2007),

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
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
